To complement your spiritual experience at the temple, you will also take a soothing dip at Banjar Hot Springs. Its heated water is mineral-rich with therapeutic benefits that may reduce tension, increase circulation and improve skin conditions. If nothing else, it will be immensely relaxing.

Gain a remarkably in-depth understanding of the Balinese culture by visiting diverse attractions in the port town of Singaraja, beginning with the royal palace. Built in the 17th century, the palace once served the Kingdom of Bulelong that ruled northern Bali. You will learn more about the island’s history at Gedong Kirtya, a library museum with a collection of manuscripts written on lontar, a paper-like substance made from dried palm leaves. For a glimpse at contemporary daily life, you will browse the stalls of Pasar Anyar, the largest traditional market in Singaraja. The variety of exotic produce and seafood is extraordinary. Although Hinduism is the prominent religion in Bali, Confucianism, Taoism and Buddhism are practiced at the temple Ling Gwan Kiong. One of the few Chinese temples on the island, it overlooks the old, now-defunct port and the remains of several Dutch colonial buildings. Don’t miss the hand-carved, painted deities on the temple’s wooden gates.

- See a variety of attractions in Singaraja that reflect the diversity of the Balinese culture.
  - Gain an understanding of Balinese history at the royal palace and at a library museum.

See how many of the crops essential to Bali are grown and then delve into Buddhism at the island’s largest Buddhist temple. The terraced rice fields near Kekeran demonstrate how farmers now successfully produce rice on steep land that was once unusable. It’s fascinating to see how the farmers have reshaped the land and devised a system of community water sharing. Similarly, at a farm near Bengkel village, you will become familiar with the agricultural techniques used to grow organic produce and medicinal herbs. Brahmavihara temple sheds light on Buddhism and how it’s practiced in Bali. Of all the temple’s Buddhist imagery, none is more impressive than the miniature replica of Borobudur, the world’s largest Buddhist archaeological site. A traditional Balinese lunch follows, after which you will spend free time shopping at Krisna Oleh-Oleh, a large mall with a wide range of merchandise such as sarongs, handicrafts and traditional souvenirs, known as “oleh-oleh.”

On the outskirts of town, you will find Beji, a Hindu temple built with white sandstone in the 15th century. It is dedicated to Dewi Sri, the goddess that protects the rice fields. You will visit another Hindu temple in the village of Jagaraga. The stone carvings there depict the cruelty of the Dutch colonists that imposed their rule on Bali in the early 20th century. These dramatic carvings are not to be missed, as most carvings in Balinese temples are of tropical flora and mythical beings. Afterwards, you will enjoy a traditional Balinese lunch.

Shop for handmade arts and crafts in two village markets renowned for their highly skilled traditional artisans. Wooden products are the specialty of the craftspeople at the Sesela Art Market, and you may see them hand-carving intricate friezes, lacquering boxes and inlaying wooden furniture with decorative shells. The process is slow and that meticulousness shows in the merchandise. Colorful textiles, beaded jewelry and woven rattan goods are also plentiful at the art market. Songket weaving is the signature technique practiced at the Sukarara Craft Village. To create songket fabric, the artisans hand-weave metallic threads together with silk or cotton yarn. As you will discover, the technique is so exacting that it can take a month to make one item. Songket fabrics usually feature traditional motifs and are brightly colored with natural dyes that resist fading. Weaving is so important to the village that nearly every house has its own loom.

- Shop for handmade goods ranging from jewelry to wooden crafts at the Sesela Art Market.
- Browse the Sukarara Craft Village for fine apparel made with songket fabric.
- Watch the artisans in Sukarara painstakingly weave the songket fabric on hand looms.
- Dress in weather-appropriate clothing.
- Wear flat comfortable walking shoes.

A tour of the factory that makes the thatching will be enlightening, as you will watch how rice straw and bundles of Kunai grass, known locally as alang-alang, are woven into roof panels. Although made entirely of natural materials, the thatched roofs are leak-proof and last up to 20 years, even in tropical conditions. Free time follows at Sundancer Beach, a tranquil setting near the southwestern tip of Lombok Island. You will have the opportunity to swim in the crystalline waters of Lombok Strait and stroll along the shore with nothing on your mind but enjoying yourself. Or simply stretch out on a beach towel and bask in the sun.

- Watch how eco-friendly roof panels are manufactured from rice straw and Kunai grass.
- Lounge about Sundancer Beach doing pretty much whatever you like.
- Enjoy an invigorating swim in the crystal-clear waters of Lombok Strait.

See one in the wild, and it will leave a lasting impression. The dragons live on the deer and pigs that inhabit the island and are surprisingly agile and fast when covering short distances. They are also good swimmers and relentless when tracking prey. As you walk the dirt paths, the park ranger will describe the intriguing habits of the Komodo dragons and the island's other animals.

- Follow a park ranger through Komodo Island, seeking Komodo dragons in the wild.
- Hear the blood-curdling details of how these giant lizards relentlessly hunt their prey.
- Listen as the park ranger describes the lizards' physical characteristics.
- Dress in weather-appropriate clothing that is not red.
- Wear flat comfortable walking shoes that can easily be cleaned.
- Bring a plastic bag to protect valuable items in case of a sudden downpour.

Tour duration can vary, depending on the pace of the participants and the trail that the rangers choose to find Komodo dragons. The tour may include up to 1½ hours of walking over dirt paths that can become muddy and strenuous with rain. The tour is not suitable for wheelchair guests, those with mobility concerns or guests with open wounds, as Komodo dragons are easily attracted to blood. Participants must stay with the groups and not try to get close to the dragons or to feed them. Only guests on tour are allowed ashore; no independent guests are permitted. Komodo dragons roam the island freely and wildlife sightings are not guaranteed.

You'll see this laid out in artistic terms on a visit to the Museum and Art Gallery of the Northern Territory – its collection brimming with Aboriginal, Southeast Asian and Oceanic artworks as well as modern Australian fine art. You don't need to be a buff to be blown away by this tour of sights showcasing Darwin's wartime heritage. This tropical city on the Timor Sea played a pivotal role in the battle against the Japanese during World War II, as Northern Territory airfields were used to carry out bombing and anti-intruder sorties. But war always has its cost, and these provocations of the enemy made Darwin a constant target for retaliatory bombings. Some 64 air raids rained down on Darwin over a two-year period, resulting in many lost Australian lives and 12 sunken ships in the harbor. You can see actual film footage of the bombings along with many other wartime artifacts during your visit to East Point Military Museum, out on a scenic spit of land at the harbor entrance. Heading further inland, you'll tour the sprawling aircraft collection at the Australian Aviation Heritage Centre. The showstopper here is a massive B-52 bomber on permanent loan from the U.S., but also on display are a B-25 Mitchell, Mirage and Sabre jet fighters, a US Army Huey Cobra with rocket pods and Gatling gun, a Mark VIII Spitfire replica and the fascinating wreckage of a Japanese Mitsubishi Zero.

- Travel by coach to East Point for panoramic photos of Darwin Harbor, twice the size of Sydney's.
- Tour the East Point Military Museum, filled with photos and artifacts from Darwin's wartime history.

A scenic half-hour ride by coach brings you to Rainforestation Nature Park, where you'll board an amphibious World War II Army Duck for a tour like no other. Piloting the vessel through the rainforest over land and water with equal ease, your Duck Captain will identify and explain fascinating plants and wildlife as you pass by. Don't be surprised to see scaly goannas soaking up the sun, a python slithering up a tree or eels swimming around the Duck. That rollicking ride is followed by a visit to the park's amphitheater for a show performed by indigenous Pamagirri Aboriginal dancers who depict animals, food-gathering and hunting through spirited music and dance. Still more local color awaits at Kuranda, a delightful village nestled in the heart of the rainforest. Established in the 1800s during the region's logging and mining heydays, this was an outpost where you could stock up on goods and enjoy some culture and sophistication at a frontier hotel. Today, Kuranda is still a haven for shops, cafés and local culture. After a brief town overview, enjoy time to explore at leisure here.

- Take a wild, amphibious tour of extraordinary Rainforestation Nature Park via WWII Army Duck.
- See and learn about the flora and fauna that live in this unspoiled, World Heritage-listed jungle.
- Watch indigenous dancers perform a fascinating live show at the rainforest amphitheater.
- Spend some free time in Kuranda, a remote mountain township with markets, cafés and shops where artwork, opals and crafts are sold.

Head across the mountains and into the Outback to tour a heritage gold rush town that still shines with boom-time grandeur. A magnificent stock exchange building went up, along with grand hotels, banks and other buildings of the era still in use today. It's a fabulous place for getting an in-person sense of what boom time life must have been like. Aside from exploring the swank town that nuggets built, you'll also tour a more rustic venue – the Venus Battery Mill, sole survivor of the 25 reducing mills that prospered here at the end of the 19th century. Gold is still being found in the area, but the richest veins have long been worked out. So modern, mechanized methods are required to tease it out – a far cry from the classic pick and shovel days and steam-driven ore processing of old. A casual café lunch and afternoon sightseeing round out this intriguing day.

- Experience the enduring boomtime grandeur of Charters Towers, where some 7 million ounces came out of the ground between 1871 and 1911.

At the other end of the ride, 2,500-acre Mungalla Station sits is a gorgeous area where the Nywaigi have lived in harmony with their environment for 45,000 years – even after European settlers disrupted their natural lifestyle in other parts of North Queensland. You will learn the fascinating story of how Irish pioneer James Cassady forged a protective relationship with the local Nywaigi when he established the station in 1901, and how the ownership of these lands has been returned to them. Over the years since, the wetlands have been restored, indigenous wildlife is flourishing once again, and the Nywaigi have grown more willing to share their cultural heritage with visitors. While here, you'll encounter many aspects of their lifestyle and enjoy a traditional communal feast where various meats, seafood and vegetables are slow-cooked in a "Kup Murri" underground oven lined with palm leaves and heated stones. You can also try your hand at boomerang-tossing.

- Travel north by coach to Mungalla Station and be immersed in the Nywaigi Aboriginal culture.
- Tour the property where wetlands and wildlife flourish, and the Nywaigi live in harmony with nature.
- Learn the heartening story of how this indigenous group regained ownership of land their ancestors occupied for tens of thousands of years.
- Share in a communal feast deliciously slow-cooked in a traditional ground oven lined with palm leaves.
- Shop for authentic Aboriginal arts and crafts and throw a boomerang, maybe even getting it to return.
- Wear weather-appropriate clothing.

This natural phenomenon is especially stunning when viewed from the elevated lookout when the tide is low.

- Race across the sea in a rigid inflatable boat known as a RIB.
- Relax on Whitehaven Beach’s exceptionally fine, soft and sparkling white sand.
- Look for wildlife, which is abundant around remote Whitehaven Beach.
- Watch the tidal current form colorful mosaics in the sea at Hill Inlet Cove.

Their offerings include a bread known as damper and billy tea boiled over a campfire.

- Cruise the Proserpine River, which is teeming with saltwater crocodiles.
- Learn about crocodile behavior and how these massive reptiles help the environment.
- Observe other indigenous wildlife while riding across the plains in an open-air wagon.
- Dine on bush tucker, a lunch made with native ingredients gathered in the wild.
