KTN-006 ALASKA FISHING & WILDERNESS DINING

Go fishing on an open-deck skiff in the pristine waters off Ketchikan and then gather around a crackling campfire and enjoy a classic Alaskan fish dinner. The captain will assess the water conditions and choose a secluded spot where you will have the best chance of catching numerous Alaskan bottom fish species. To add to the fun, you will use light tackle so even average-size fish will be more exciting to land. After a couple of hours on the water, you will disembark on the shore of a spruce and cedar rainforest and settle in while the camp cook prepares dinner. The bottom-feeders that you have caught will be served atop a saffron-infused bouillabaisse. Seasoned potatoes in a homemade fish broth, warm sourdough rolls and rhubarb-blueberry bread pudding round out the menu.

- ·Fish in the waters off Ketchikan in a skiff with only a few other anglers.
- Use the provided light tackle and bait that's been selected for what's biting that day.
- ·Enjoy your fresh catch for dinner around a campfire in the rainforest.
- ·Dress in weather-appropriate clothing.
- ·Wear flat comfortable walking shoes.

Participants must be at least 5 years of age, weigh at least 30 lbs. and no more than 300 lbs. and be physically active. We recommended that you wear warm, layered clothing. Rain gear, rubber boots, comfortable float jackets, wool socks, hats, gloves, fishing equipment and tackle are provided. Actual fishing duration varies from two to three hours. Tour requires negotiating uneven terrain and the skiff is open to the elements. Alaska State Law requires a fishing license that can be purchased in cash at the outfitting room for \$25. Guests who go ashore do so with the understanding that they will be mixing with members of the general public. This tour is perfect for serious adventurers or families seeking a personalized tour, this excursion is customized for your interest and skill level with just five or six guests per boat. Light tackle is our specialty, which ensures that even average sized fish are exciting and rewarding to bring aboard"

Cruise past the naturally beautiful islands around Ketchikan while observing iconic Alaskan wildlife and unique points of interest. Once onboard, relax inside the heated main cabin, out on the observation deck, or move from place to place as you see fit. No matter where you sit or stand, the views will be spectacular. You will see the historic lighthouse on Guard Island, the totem poles at Totem Bight State Park and the now-shuttered Ward Cove pulp mill. You will also witness a diversity of ecosystems as you cruise past coastal residential areas on Revillagigedo Island and along the undeveloped shoreline of Gravina Island, much of which is blanketed by the Tongass National Forest, our world's largest temperate rainforest. Wildlife is abundant, so keep an eye out for bald eagles, harbor seals and seabirds. A sampler plate of Alaskan specialties, including a traditional alder-smoked salmon, will enhance the experience.

- ·Admire Alaska's natural beauty while cruising to and from Guard Island.
- ·Relax in the boat's heated main cabin or out on the observation deck.

Cruise through Misty Fjords, a waterway that ancient glaciers carved out of the rugged landscape, leaving behind a natural wonderland of sheer vertical cliffs, roaring waterfalls and endless beauty. To reach the fjords, you will pass through Revillagigedo Channel and proceed into the Behm Canal, a waterway where orcas, seals and porpoises are often spotted. The occasional stop will be made along the way to view an active bald eagle's nest, a pictograph that the Tlingits etched into a stone cliff and New Eddystone Rock, an immense volcanic spire that rises above the sea. While cruising through Misty Fjords, the onboard naturalist will describe the fjord's natural history and point out seabirds that may be nesting in the cliffs. After your cruise, you will be dropped off in downtown Ketchikan where you can explore and shop before hopping on a shuttle back to the ship.














KTN-025 KNUDSON COVE SALMON SPORTSFISHING

Try your luck fishing in crystal-clear waters teeming with salmon, while enjoying a stunning backdrop of glacier-carved bays and fjords and the natural beauty of Tongass National Forest. Ketchikan is known as the Salmon Capital of the World, so there is no better place to catch these highly prized sportfish. Once you reach the prime fishing grounds, a deckhand will supply you with fishing gear and you will troll for salmon using a downrigger. Anglers will rotate from rod to rod, so that everyone has the same amount of time on each one. Five species of salmon live in these waters, including king salmon, which are also called Chinook salmon. Pink salmon are the most abundant species and they are vigorous fighters. If you want to keep what you catch, it can be processed and shipped anywhere in the United States.

- ·Fish for hard-fighting, highly prized salmon.
- ·Enjoy a stunningly beautiful, natural backdrop.
- ·Ship your catch home if you wish.
- Dress warmly in layered clothing.
- ·Wear comfortable rubber-soled shoes.

Participants must be at least 6 years of age. Fishing lasts approximately 3 ½ to 4 hours. Alaska State Law requires a fishing license that can be purchased on the fishing boat for \$25. During king salmon season, you must purchase an additional \$15 tag. If you decide to process your catch and ship it home, you will need a credit card. Fish can only be shipped within the United States.

KTN-031 THE BERING SEA - CRAB FISHERMAN'S TOUR

Join seasoned Bering Sea fishermen for an extraordinary journey of discovery on the Aleutian Ballad, a storied crab boat featured on the television series "Deadliest Catch." You will set out into the protected waters off Ketchikan and relax in the heated and sheltered outdoor amphitheater until the boat reaches prime crabbing water. In time, the crew will start hauling up crab pots and long lines from the depths, revealing all manner of sea life such as king crab, octopus, prawns and rock fish. The catch will then be placed into an on-deck aquarium for you to view and even touch, if you desire. The crew will also relate stories of their lives at sea and point out the indigenous marine life, which may include seals, sea otters and whales.

- ·Head to sea on a crab boat from the TV show "Deadliest Catch."
- ·Watch the fishermen haul up crab pots and lines full of seafood.
- ·Observe the catch in the on-deck aquarium.
- Look for marine life and seabirds.
- Dress warmly in layered clothing.
- ·Wear flat, comfortable walking shoes.

Guests must be at least 5 years of age. We recommend you dress warmly and in layers. Time spent on Aleutian Ballad is approximately 3 hours, transportation to and from port is 1.5 hours. The crab pot used for demonstration purposes will contain artificial crabs as the king pot has been repurposed to help unfortunate families. This ""memorial"" pot is covered in tags that people have written to loved ones and all guests are given the opportunity to add a tag if they choose and to make a donation to the Fishermen's Memorial Fund of which the proceeds go toward helping fishermen's families. However, live crabs are in the on-deck aquarium. This tour is not exclusive to Regent Seven Seas guests.

KTN-032 TONGASS RAINFOREST EXPEDITION

Walk through the pristine natural environment of Tongass National Forest, the largest such wilderness in America. As you follow the shaded nature trail through the understory, you can expect to be enthralled by the majesty of the towering, centuries-old trees and the serenity of the forest. While pausing at a meadow, the naturalist guide will identify some of the more unusual plants and describe their characteristics. You will enjoy a different perspective of the wilderness from a viewing platform at a nearby waterfall, where bald eagles are often spotted. You will also pause farther down the trail next to a crystal-clear stream where salmon spawn each year. Here, the guide will explain some of the traditions and legends of the indigenous people that lived in the forest.

- ·Hike through Tongass National Forest.
- ·Marvel at the serenity and towering ancient trees.
- ·Listen to the naturalist describe the flora and fauna.
- ·Look for bald eagles and spawning salmon in season.
- Dress warmly in layered clothing.
- ·Wear flat closed-toe walking shoes.

This tour covers approximately two miles of moderate hiking over natural terrain. It is not available to wheelchair guests or those with mobility concerns. Participants should be in good physical condition. While there is are restroom facilities at the trail head, there are no facilities along the trail. Participants must be at least four years old and children under 18 must be accompanied by a parent or adult guardian. Strollers and walkers are not allowed on the trail. Wildlife sightings are not guaranteed.














KTN-048 HUNTING FOR HALIBUT

Fish for giant halibut in the protected fishing grounds not far from Baranof's downtown marina, where these coveted flatfish voraciously feed throughout the summer. On the way there, you can admire the majestic scenery and look for wildlife such as breaching whales. The crew will offer valuable tips on how to fish with circle hooks, work the sandy flats and jig in deeper waters. The state record for these behemoths stands at more than 450 pounds and catching a 100-pound halibut isn't unusual. Imagine the thrill of hooking a monster fish and reeling it in from the depths. The larger ones are usually females and can grow up to eight feet in length and five feet in width, which is why they're often referred to as "barn doors." If you catch one, you'll notice that a halibut has smooth scales, a light-colored bottom side and a darker top, colors that provide natural camouflage.

- ·Fish for halibut and Pacific cod in relatively remote waters away from other anglers.
- ·Use the crew's advice and fishing tips to increase your chances for landing a big fish.
- ·Watch for breaching whales, seals and eagles when cruising the fishing grounds.
- Dress warmly in layered clothing and light rain gear.
- ·Wear flat comfortable shoes with non-slip soles.

Guests are advised to dress warmly in layers and bring a hat and gloves, all-weather gear will be provided. The minimum age to participate on this tour is five years old, children must be accompanied by a parent and be prepared for a long fishing day. This tour operates in wet weather and includes approximately 3 hours of actual fishing time. Rubber-soled or deck shoes must be worn on the boat. Each boat will accommodate up to six guests. Due to the Nature of this tour It is not available to wheelchair guests and any guests subject to seasickness should take proper precautions. Fish Processing Plant is closed from September 15th to May 15th.

KTN-049 SEA CYCLE OCEAN ADVENTURE

Pedal a pontoon-style Sea-Cycle around the estuary at Ward Cove as the guide describes the scenic beauty and area history. Each two-person Sea-Cycle boat allows for leisurely pedaling yet leaves your hands free to snap photos of the surrounding natural wonders. There is plenty to view, especially when passing Tongass National Forest, the largest such protected landscape in America. The dense forests of red cedars, hemlocks and Sitka spruces will seem to go on forever. Along the way, the guide will elaborate on how many Alaskans still subsist on food and medicines that they harvest from the woodlands and sea. Be sure to keep an eye out for eagles soaring overhead and seals and bears along the shore. Ducks are among the most prevalent animals in the tidal estuary. Ward Cove is noteworthy for being the site of Alaska's first pulp mill and home to one of the area's most productive fish canneries.

- ·Pedal a two-person Sea-Cycle boat around the estuary at Ward Cove and along the sea.
- ·Take in the natural beauty of Tongass National Forest, America's largest such landscape.
- ·Look for indigenous wildlife such as bears, eagles and seals.
- Learn about the history of Ward Cove and how it once fueled Ketchikan's economy.
- ·Dress in weather-appropriate clothing.
- ·Wear flat, comfortable, non-slip shoes.

This tour is not available to guests who utilize a wheelchair. Those guests with mobility concerns are cautioned to evaluate their personal level of ability and stamina. Guests will be outfitted in rain gear (weather permitting) and issued a life jacket prior to going down to the pier. Guests should be able to navigate a steep ramp due to tidal variations. A safety briefing will be conducted on the pier and then two guests share a sea cycle, both sides equipped with pedals to propel the pontoon style watercraft. Guests will need to pedal for approximately 3.5 miles at a leisurely pace. Guests who go ashore do so with the understanding that they will be mixing with members of the general public. Maximum combined weight is 550lbs.

KTN-050 RAINFOREST E-BIKE & NATURE WALK

Ride an electric bike inland to Connell Lake while admiring the natural beauty of the surrounding Tongass National Forest. As you will discover during the initial briefing, the electric-enhanced bicycle will boost your pedal power, allowing you to ride farther and negotiate hills with considerably less effort than with a conventional bicycle. It's only about three miles to the Connell Lake, all of it staggeringly beautiful. Sitka black-tailed deer are commonly seen along this route. The flora is also exceptional, especially the carnivorous sundew plants that consume insects that they trap on their sticky pads. Upon reaching the lake, you will learn how it was created in 1952 by damming several creeks to provide millions of gallons of freshwater to the Ketchikan pulp mill. The dam continues to feed water to different resources throughout the community even after the pulp mill closed more than 25 years ago. Before pedaling back, you can relax around a campfire under a canopy of coniferous trees or walk a short nature trail.

- ·Pedal an electric-enhanced bicycle to and from Connell Lake, a roundtrip of about six miles.
- Gain a historical perspective of the manmade lake, which once provided millions of gallons of freshwater needed to operate the Ketchikan pulp mill.
- Learn about the indigenous flora and fauna from the naturalist guide.
- Dress in weather-appropriate clothing.
- ·Wear flat comfortable walking shoes.



Those guests with mobility concerns are cautioned to evaluate their personal level of ability and stamina. Guests will bicycle a total of approximately 6 miles roundtrip on an e-bike that has both pedal assist option and a throttle assist for a very easy ride. Guests should be comfortable riding a bicycle. The trail is a mix of gravel and forest ground and may include muddy portions. The nature trail is a mix of boardwalk, gravel, and forest floor. Guests who go ashore do so with the understanding that they will be mixing with members of the general public.

Paddle a two-person kayak across the calm waters of Connell Lake, a manmade reservoir that the Tongass National Forest surrounds. Following a briefing to help you maximize the experience, you will ease into a kayak and follow the guide around the lake. This beautiful body of water was created in 1952 by damming several creeks to feed millions of gallons of freshwater to the Ketchikan pulp mill. The 60-foot concrete dam still exists and continues to supply water to resources throughout the community. Today, Connell Lake is known more for its spectacular natural beauty, which you will see up-close as you paddle along the forested shore of America's largest national park. Unusual flora and fauna abound, which the guide will describe as you paddle around the lake to several hidden wonders.

- ·Kayak across naturally beautiful Connell Lake, all of which the Tongass National Forest surrounds.
- ·Gain a historical perspective of the manmade lake, which once provided millions of gallons of freshwater needed to operate the Ketchikan pulp mill.
- Learn about the indigenous flora and fauna from the naturalist guide.
- Dress in weather-appropriate clothing.
- Wear flat comfortable walking shoes.

PLEASE NOTE This tour is not available to guests who utilize a wheelchair. Those guests with mobility concerns are cautioned to evaluate their personal level of ability and stamina. This tour takes place in tandem, sit inside style kayaks that participants will paddle for 75 minutes. There are 20 stairs that must be navigated getting down to the kayak. Guests who go ashore do so with the understanding that they will be mixing with members of the general public.

KTN-052 TALBOT LAKE RAINFOREST HIKE

Hike to Talbot Lake following a natural trail through Tongass National Forest, the largest national forest in America. Although the hike is only about three miles long roundtrip, the surrounding scenery is wonderfully varied and spectacular. You will walk in the shadow of towering western hemlocks, Sitka spruce and red cedars, all indigenous to the area. The naturalist guide will narrate the hike by describing the native flora and fauna and detailing the history of the area, which was once crucial to the logging industry. In the decades since the last pulp mill closed, the forest has regained its splendor and wildlife has flourished. You may spot eagles, deer, and beavers, which are particularly prevalent along the trail at Talbot Lake. The lake-view setting couldn't be more serene as you sip hot chocolate while gathered around a campfire. You may see anglers fishing for cutthroat trout, but otherwise you will likely have the woods to yourself.

- ·Hike three miles roundtrip through Tongass National Forest, America's largest such landscape.
- ·Follow the trail to beautiful Talbot Lake and gather around a crackling campfire.
- ·Learn about the flora, fauna, and local history from the naturalist guide.
- Dress in weather-appropriate clothing.
- ·Wear flat comfortable walking shoes.

PLEASE NOTE Participants must be at least 5 years of age. This tour is not available to guests who utilize a wheelchair. Those guests with mobility concerns are cautioned to evaluate their personal level of ability and stamina. Guests will hike approximately 3 miles roundtrip on a trail consisting of gravel, soil and natural elements and cross a timber bridge. Conditions of the trail will vary and can be muddy in parts based on weather conditions. Guests who go ashore do so with the understanding that they will be mixing with members of the general public.

KTN-053 SELF-DRIVE ZODIAC ADVENTURE

Cruise through the spectacular Tongass Narrows in a Zodiac boat and take in the extraordinary coastal scenery with the chance of seeing iconic Alaskan wildlife. You may captain the 4-person Zodiac or ride along as a passenger. Either way, the views from sea level will be breathtaking. You will follow the guide's boat past the islands off Refuge Cove and on to Totem Bight State Historical Park, home to a replica village like the ones the indigenous Tlingit and Haidas inhabited in the 19th century. The guide will entertain you with stories about these earlier times, logging, and the history of businesses such as the Ketchikan Pulp Mill. The Tongass Narrows is teeming with wildlife, and you may spot orcas and humpback whales breaching the water's surface. Bald eagles are commonly seen soaring above, along the shore and feasting on fish that they have just plucked from the sea.

- ·Skirt along the spectacularly scenic shoreline of the Tongass Narrows in a Zodiac boat.
- Captain the Zodiac, be one of three passengers or switch positions if you like.
- ·Look for wildlife that includes orcas, humpback whales and bald eagles.
- Learn about the indigenous Tlingit and Haida people and how they lived in the 19th century.
- ·Dress in weather-appropriate clothing.
- ·Wear flat comfortable walking shoes.

PLEASE NOTE This tour is not available to guests who utilize a wheelchair. Those guests with mobility concerns are cautioned to evaluate their personal level of ability and stamina. Guests must be at least 25 years old to drive with a valid driver's license. The tour route will vary based on current conditions, wildlife sightings and group. Guests should be able to navigate a steep ramp due to tidal variations, be able to board a Zodiac and be comfortable for up to two hours on the water in varying conditions without bathroom access. This tour is conducted using 4-pax Zodiac boats with the guide in a lead boat. Participants should weigh between 30lbs and 350lbs with a minimum age of 6 years old. This tour is not a good choice for guests with back or neck injuries or expectant mothers. The Zodiac is not covered or shaded. Guests will be outfitted with a life jacket, rain jacket, rain pants and rubber boots. Parties smaller than 4 will be paired up. Wildlife sightings are not guaranteed. Guests who go ashore do so with the understanding that they will be mixing with members of the general public.








Gain an understanding of the lives of the First Nations people at a replica 19th-century village and in a forest where they still harvest medicinal plants. Tlingit and Haida guides will share their cultures with you in the village clan house in Totem Bight State Park. The colorful totem poles throughout the village are carved with animal figures that reflect the myths and legends of the indigenous people. For instance, the raven is often portrayed in stories as a trickster and is said to be capable of changing its form at will. You will delve deeper into the culture while walking a woodlands trail at Connell Lake. The guides will point out and describe edible plants such as Labrador tea, bearded lichen, and fireweed. They will also show you how spiny devil's club is carefully harvested to use as fishhooks, tattoo ink and even as a natural medicine for arthritis. A snack of local foods follows.

- ·Learn about the First Nations cultures at a replica 19th-century village.
- ·Gain insight into the symbols of animals that adorn the village's many totem poles.
- Follow indigenous guides along a trail at Connell Lake and hear how they use medicinal plants.
- ·Snack on locally harvested foods that may include salmon and wild berries.
- ·Dress in weather-appropriate clothing.
- ·Wear flat comfortable walking shoes.

This tour is not available to guests who utilize a wheelchair. Those guests with mobility concerns are cautioned to evaluate their personal level of ability and stamina. This tour requires stepping into and out of a van, as well as standing for about an hour at a time. The walking paths are gravel and boardwalk but mostly flat. Guests who go ashore do so with the understanding that they will be mixing with members of the general public.

OVERVIEW Cruise the scenic Tongass Narrows to downtown Ketchikan and enjoy a sampling of locally brewed beer along the way. The views will be spectacular the entire time and a naturalist will be on board to point out and describe the wildlife. Bald eagles, porpoises and seals are often spotted as the waterway is protected and makes for an ideal habitat. This pristine environment is home to black bears, eagles, seals and other species that feed on the more than 100,000 salmon that come each year to spawn. The elevated platform presents an excellent vantage point to view the wildlife up close. It will be quite the sight as some salmon will be caught while others will make it farther upstream. Later, you will watch injured birds of prey rehabilitating at the Alaska Raptor Center, tour a historical sawmill and see a master artisan carve a totem

Participants will be required to sign a liability waiver before being allowed to take part in the tour. Ride time is 30 mins after the scheduled time on the printed ticket or wristband. Ride times are called in order from early to late. Arriving before designated time, may require to wait for some time. After checking in, there are two ways to arrive to the zip rider: by taking the Skyglider gondola (10 minutes) or by taking a 10 minute walk (1/4 mile) on gravel trail.

Go fishing for halibut in Icy Strait, where these giant flatfish are voraciously feeding throughout the summer. Meeting at the dock, you will embark your comfortable cabin cruiser and receive a safety orientation before taking the 20-30 minute ride out to the premier fishing area in Icy Strait. These waters are teeming with halibut as they serve as the main migration corridor for halibut traveling from the Pacific to their summer feeding grounds and spawning streams in southeast Alaska. The largest Pacific flatfish, Alaskan halibut are renowned for their mammoth size. The former state record halibut-a 440-pound whopper-was landed near Hoonah, and catching a 100-pounder in Icy Strait isn't unusual. Imagine the thrill of hooking one of these monster fish and reeling it in from the depths. It's an amazing experience because halibut are longer than most flatfishes with a width one third of their length, so that husky girth produces a lot of resistance. You will spend approximately 2.5 hours on the water, fishing with bait that may include herring, salmon and octopus, which is one of the halibut's favorite meals. If you catch one, you'll notice that halibut has smooth scales, a light-colored bottom side and a darker top. The colors are a natural camouflage that mimics the hues of the ocean floor and water. Not only are these waters home to halibut, they are also filled with whales, sea lion, and seals so come prepared with your camera and binoculars. At the conclusion of your fishing time, you will head back to the pier where your tour concludes.

- ·Fish for mammoth halibut in an area where 100-pounders are often caught.
- ·Look for whales, sea lions and seals as you fish
- ·Enjoy the comforts of a cabin cruiser with all the tackle and gear provided.
- ·Wear flat comfortable shoes with non-slip soles.
- ·Dress warmly in lavers.
- ·Bring waterproof outerwear, as you may be exposed to the elements.
- ·Come prepared with a camera to document your fish story.

This tour includes very limited walking, although there are steps to board the fishing vessel. The tour is not available to wheelchair guests or those with mobility concerns. Persons who are prone to sea sickness should take appropriate pre-emptive measures before commencing the tour. Minimum age for participation is six years old and children under 18 years of age must be accompanied by a parent or adult guardian. Alaska state law requires participants to purchase a one-day fishing license for \$20 before the excursion starts. This tour is catch and release only. Following that, you will hop in your two-person kayak and begin your adventure. You'll spend nearly two hours paddling about these pristine waters, delighting in the serenity and joy of being out on the water, as well as having the opportunity to observe the bountiful wildlife that inhabits this wilderness area. Your guide will help you spot animals, explain their habits, and offer all sorts of tidbits to maximize your time kayaking along the shoreline. While there are no certainties regarding what you might observe, humpback whales typically feed along the very same route that you will be traveling. You may see one in the distance breaching the water's surface, waving its fluke before diving, or spy hopping, which is when a whale pokes just its head out of the water to look around. The nutrient-rich waters of Icy Strait are also home to orcas, sea lions, porpoises, sea otters and seals. During your excursion, you will also paddle to an even more serene area, frequented by bald eagles. There are few sights more visually arresting than following the flight of one of these majestic creatures as it rides the wind until swooping down to catch a fish with its talons. After returning to the beach at Icy Strait Point, you will turn in your equipment and head back to the ship, or perhaps visit the nearby Welcome Center.

- Kayak through Icy Strait Point, an area teeming with marine life.
- ·Watch for humpback whales feeding in the nutrient-rich waters.
- Appreciate the wilderness even more as the naturalist explains its biodiversity.
- Look for bald eagles riding the wind until they swoop down to catch fish in their talons.
- ·Wear sturdy flat shoes





Because the waters are nutrient-rich, seabirds flock here to feed. The nearby ferry terminal is a favorite place for pigeon guillemots, one of the most common diving seabirds in southeast Alaska. A brief stop at an active bald eagle's nest will reveal how this easy-to-recognize bird of prey lives. More excellent chances to spot birds, especially cormorants, await you along the Long Island causeway. Then, your guide will lead your small group down a forest trail and through grasslands to observe passerines, the huge order of songbirds that includes sparrows, warblers and flycatchers. The feisty rufous hummingbird is also found here, when not following the largest migration route of any American humminabird.

During the other animal encounter, you will watch giant Pacific octopuses being feed and learn about these elusive, solitary sea creatures. The only hard part of an octopus is its parrot-like beak. Consequently, even a 50-pounder can fit its soft-tissue body through a 2-inch opening. Octopus have the uncanny ability to quickly change the color and texture of their skin, which is why they are called "chameleons of the sea." The scientists will elaborate on the characteristics of the animals that you encounter.

- ·Hand-feed puffins and learn about their behavior at the Alaska Sealife Center.
- ·Encounter a giant Pacific octopus as an aquarist explains its behavior and characteristics.

However, the remnants of its outer stone walls and guard tower are original and important enough for the castle to be designated a National Historic Monument. While touring the castle, you will see a statue of Date Masamune on horseback, wearing his iconic battle helmet adorned with a crescent-shaped moon. He was a fierce warrior known as the One-Eyed Dragon because he lost an eye to smallpox as a child. Continuing on, you will next visit nearby Osaki Hachimangu shrine, which Date Masamune also ordered to be constructed in the early 17th century. The shrine's deity is the Shinto god of war that is considered to be the protector of Sendai. The greatest craftsmen of the time built the shrine, and it remains a Momoyama-style architectural masterpiece. It features elaborately decorated gables and is painted with black lacquer that lends it a dignified appearance. In contrast, the main worship hall is understated. Please note: This tour includes approximately 2-hours of walking/standing on mostly flat terrain, with approximately 100 steps to negotiate at Osaki Hachiman Shrine. This tour is not recommended for wheel chair guests or those with walking or mobility concerns. Weather appropriate clothing, adequate sun protection and flat, comfortable walking shoes are recommended.

This tour includes approximately 2-hours of walking/standing on mostly flat terrain, with approximately 100 steps to negotiate at Osaki Hachiman Shrine. This tour is not recommended for wheel chair guests or those with walking or mobility concerns. 

Discover the charms of Kamakura, an ancient capital with a profusion of temples and shrines and an exceptionally popular shopping area. Your first stop will be at the Great Buddha, an outdoor bronze statue that lords over the grounds of Kotokuin temple. Cast in 1252, the 93-ton statue was housed inside another temple until the 15th century, when a tsunami destroyed the building. The Great Buddha is seated in the lotus position, his hands positioned in a meditative gesture. You will also explore nearby Tsurugaoka Hachimangu shrine, which was founded in the 11th century and dedicated to the Shinto god of war. The shrine's lotus ponds and tree-lined lanes are wonderfully peaceful and will leave you in an ideal frame of mind for the excitement you can expect to encounter at historical Komachi Dori. This always-busy stylish street is lined with hundreds of restaurants and boutiques, and you will have plenty of time to explore them.

See an array of landmarks in the sprawling port of Yokohama, the first port open to foreign trade when Japan ended its isolationist policy in the mid-1800s. While walking through the traditional garden of Sankeien, you will see a three-story pagoda rising above the verdant foliage. It was built in Kyoto in the 1400s and moved to the garden in 1914. You will enjoy a sweeping view of the bayside and beyond from the observation deck of Yokohama Marine Tower, which commemorates the 100th anniversary of the opening of Yokohama's port. After a short but enlightening walk, you will arrive in Chinatown, the largest in Japan. Hundreds of shops line the maze of streets selling everything from natural herbs to fine jewelry. The aroma of freshly cooked Chinese dishes will be wafting through the air as you meander along, perhaps passing colorful Kanteibyo temple. A centerpiece of Chinatown, it is dedicated to the Chinese god of good business and prosperity

Discover two traditional and ancient attractions that coexist in stark contrast with Yokohama's futuristic skyscrapers and bustling city streets. Although located in the very heart of Tokyo, Meiji Shrine is surrounded by a dense forest glade. Tokyo's most renowned Shinto shrine, it is dedicated to Emperor Meiji the Great, who transformed Japan from a feudal state into a world power. The soaring torii gate entry makes quite the statement, as it was constructed with 1,500-year-old cypress. Once inside the elegant shrine, you will likely feel a great sense of serenity. That same sense of tranquility pervades Hama Rikyu Garden, an Edo Period garden surrounded by soaring skyscrapers. The garden was originally built as a feudal lord's Tokyo residence and duck hunting grounds, but later served as a strolling garden and as imperial palace. Chances are, an abundance of flowers will be in bloom, as that is how Hama Rikyu Gardens was designed.

Enter Meiji Shrine by first passing through a towering torii gate made with 1,500-year-old cypress.

Feel a great sense of peace within Meiji Shrine, as it nestles in a rural setting.

Meander through an equally tranquil Edo Period garden originally constructed for a feudal lord.

·Dress in weather-appropriate clothing.

·Wear flat comfortable walking shoes.
