HUB-001 HUBBARD GLACIER & WILDERNESS EXPLORER

OVERVIEW Cruise remarkably close to Hubbard Glacier for the ultimate look at this huge river of ice that has the distinction of being North America's largest tidewater glacier. After boarding the boat directly from the cruise ship in the mouth of Disenchantment Bay, you will settle into the heated cabin with large windows that provide excellent viewing. The vessel also features a shallow draft, allowing it to easily cruise around the icebergs near the face of the glacier, which is hundreds of feet high above the waterline. Hubbard Glacier is nicknamed the Galloping Glacier because at times it advances several feet a day. Few natural sights are quite so spectacular as when large chunks of ice calve – or break off – from the glacier with a thundering roar. The naturalist guide will describe the glacier's characteristics in fascinating detail, as well as the wildlife, which includes harbor seals, bald eagles, orcas and even humpback whales.

- See Hubbard Glacier up close from the comfort of a heated, expedition-style boat.
- Behold the sheer face of the glacier, which soars hundreds of feet above the waterline.
- Hear compelling commentary about Hubbard Glacier from the naturalist guide.
- Look for harbor seals, orcas and humpback whales, which inhabit the surrounding waters.

SIT-025 ALASKA BEARS & SILVER BAY HOMESTEAD EXPERIENCE**Duration:** 3.50 Hrs **Tour Price:** \$149.00**Retail Price:** \$299.00**Date:** September 15, 2023 08:45 AM

See how orphaned and displaced bears are rehabilitated in a rescue center and explore a remote homestead on a deep-water fjord. You will enjoy an up-close view of the animals at the Fortress of the Bear, where brown and black bears are typically in residence. The naturalists will elaborate on why the bears were brought to the center, their personality traits and their chances of being released back into the wild. The stories are inspiring, as many of the bears were once malnourished, injured or orphaned. Living in the remote Alaska wilderness can be challenging for animals and people, as you will discover in more detail at a private homestead on Silver Bay. The same family has lived there for generations and are happy share their experiences as you tour the property and gather around a campfire. You can also expect to learn about the indigenous Tlingits that first settled the area.

- Watch rescued brown and black bears in the Fortress of the Bear rehabilitation center.
- Hear how the bears have been brought back to health in hopes of releasing them.
- Visit a remote homestead on the deep-water fjord Silver Bay.
- Learn about the challenges of living in the Alaska wilderness.
- Dress warmly in weather-appropriate clothing i.e. light rain jacket and layers.
- Wear flat comfortable walking shoes.

Boat is accessed on the dock. Guests may need to walk up or down a steep ramp. The boat is a heated expedition catamaran that has inside seating area with a restroom. This tour may be conducted in reverse order. Light snack provided.

SIT-001 RAPTOR CENTER AND HISTORIC PARK**Duration:** 4.75 Hrs **Tour Price:** \$0.00**Retail Price:** \$129.00**Date:** September 15, 2023 09:00 AM

Trace Russia's influence on Sitka in the 19th century and tour a raptor center that rescues injured birds in hopes of returning them to the wild. The Russians first gained a foothold in Alaska in 1804 by overpowering the indigenous Tlingits. That battlefield is now part of the Sitka National Historical Park, where you will browse exhibits explaining the conflict. Here you can walk the forest trail lined with totems, view cultural exhibits or talk with local native artists. This tour also presents the chance to see Alaskan wildlife up close at the Alaska Raptor Center, a rehabilitation facility for birds of prey. This Bald Eagle Center operates with bird care professionals assisted by volunteers to rescue birds, provide them with rehabilitative care and hopefully release them back into the wild. Time will be available to view the flight center, clinic window, outside deck habitat areas and gift shop.

- Discover how Russia controlled Sitka until selling Alaska in 1867.
- Visit Castle Hill, where Russia transferred Alaska to America.
- Explore Sitka National Historical Park and walk along totem lined trails.
- Watch an avian demonstration at a raptor rehabilitation facility.
- Dress warmly in layered weather-appropriate clothing.
- Wear flat comfortable walking shoes.

This tour involves walking of up to one mile within an hour and a half. The order of sites visited may be reversed. This tour does allow wheelchairs as there are ramps at the stops although there are steps to go inside the cathedral.

SIT-003 SITKA CYCLING AND FOREST WALK**Duration:** 3.00 Hrs **Tour Price:** \$0.00**Retail Price:** \$169.00**Date:** September 15, 2023 09:00 AM

Explore a side of Sitka that few visitors experience by bicycling around town and walking through a rainforest. The bicycling portion of the tour will begin along the undeveloped coastline south of town. Here, nature reigns supreme. Forest-covered mountains rise in the distance, uninhabited islands dot the bays and wildlife flourishes. It's no wonder that Jean-Michel Cousteau's Ocean Futures Society recommends this tour as an inspiration to act responsibly for the protection of our planet's vital ecosystems. This part of Alaska has changed little over the centuries and the intention is to retain the natural beauty in its pristine condition. You will enjoy a different perspective of Sitka's natural wonders by walking through Tongass National Forest, the largest national forest in America. Along the way, the guide will point out the most noteworthy flora and fauna and describe the species in detail.

- Enjoy spectacular coastal views while bicycling south of Sitka.
- Follow a nature trail through America's largest national forest.
- Learn fascinating facts about the surrounding natural wonders.
- Dress warmly comfortable weather-appropriate clothing.
- Wear sturdy closed-toe walking shoes.

This tour involves a gently rolling, four-mile bicycle ride and up to two miles of walking. The tour is recommended for guests that are in good physical condition and able to ride a bike. Riders will be required to wear the provided helmet. Raingear will be provided, if needed. Participants must be at least 10 years old and at least 4' 10" tall. Those under the age of 18 must be accompanied by a parent. This non-smoking tour operates in all weather conditions.

SIT-004 SEA OTTER AND WILDLIFE QUEST**(PRICES IN USD PER PERSON)****Duration: 3.00 Hrs Tour Price: \$0.00****Retail Price: \$199.00****Date: September 15, 2023 09:00 AM, 01:00 PM**

Cruise the pristine waters off Sitka in search of marine life such as sea otters while listening to a naturalist elaborate on the most intriguing characteristics of the species. You may settle into a comfortable seat in the boat's main cabin or remain topside on the observation deck. Either way, you will enjoy an uninterrupted view of the sea. As you scan the waters for marine life, the naturalist will describe how humpback whales feed here in the summer and how animals such as sea otters now thrive. The animals were nearly extinct due to aggressive fur hunting in the early 1800s, and their comeback is a wonderful success story. Other creatures commonly spotted include sea lions, porpoise, harbor seals and a huge variety of seabirds. Puffins are particularly easy to identify because of their bright orange beaks.

- Scan the waters off Sitka for marine life such as whales and sea otters.
- Look along the shore for brown bears and skyward for bald eagles.
- Listen to the naturalist describe the animals' unusual habits and habitats.
- Dress warmly in layered, weather-appropriate clothing.
- Wear flat comfortable walking shoes with non-skid soles.

The tour operators guarantee that you will see sea otters, a whale or a bear, or you will receive a \$100 refund upon disembarkation. The tour operates in all weather conditions. Each vessel features a warm and comfortable cabin with enclosed seating, large windows, a snack bar and restrooms. Binoculars, a souvenir route guide, complimentary snacks and beverages will be provided. Participants must negotiate 3-4 steps with non-lifting assistance to embark & disembark the catamaran.

Browse Sitka's finest galleries while watching local artists create imaginative works of art in silver, wood, ceramic and glass. Once known as the "Paris of the Pacific," Sitka claims to have had the first opera house, performing arts theater and grand piano on North America's west coast. Sitka still zealously supports its artists, many of whom you will see at work in the cultural district. As you meander through the galleries, you will most likely see artists creating magnificent pieces in glass. Some of their techniques are similar to those used by the Italian artisans on the Venetian island of Murano, although the Sitka artists use kilns not roaring furnaces. If you feel inspired to work with glass yourself, ask one of the artists to get you started. It's a common request, so don't be shy. As you will see in many of the finished works, the inspiration was Sitka's natural beauty.

- Watch artists masterfully creating works of art in various media.
- See how the artists emulate the glassmakers in Italy.
- Try your hand at glassmaking, if the occasion arises.
- Purchase fine art from the galleries, if you choose.
- Dress warmly in layered clothing.
- Wear flat, comfortable walking shoes.

This tour is conducted on foot and includes approximately 90 minutes of guided easy to moderate walking. The tour is not available to wheelchair guests and those with mobility concerns are cautioned to carefully evaluate their personal level of stamina and ability. Layered cotton clothing and sun glasses are recommended. Sturdy, flat shoes with a closed-toe are required.

Explore the city's historical highlights and the attractions that showcase the indigenous wildlife, starting at the Alaska Raptor Center. Injured birds of prey receive medical treatment at the center in hopes of releasing them back into the wild. You will not only learn about the different birds but also observe many of them up close, including great-horned owls, red-tailed hawks and peregrine falcons. Similarly, at the Fortress of the Bear, you will see orphaned brown bears that have been rescued and now live in a protected environment. You can photograph the animals from a raised viewing platform that provides an excellent perspective. For a look into the history of the area, you will visit the spot where the Russians first gained a foothold in Alaska in 1804 by overpowering the indigenous Tlingits. That battlefield is now part of the Sitka National Historical Park, where you will browse exhibits that explain the conflict.

- Watch an avian demonstration at a raptor rehabilitation facility.
- Photograph orphaned brown bears up close at a rescue facility.
- Delve into the history of Sitka at a park that recounts the watershed Battle of 1804.
- Dress in weather-appropriate clothing.

The order of sites visited may be reversed. At the end of the tour, guests will be dropped off in town to explore Sitka on their own. A shuttle back to the pier runs every 10 minutes when the ship is docked.

Settle in aboard an expedition catamaran for a wonderfully picturesque cruise to a private island, the starting point for a kayaking adventure through the Siginaka Islands. The cruise will set the stage for what lies ahead, as the scenery will be spectacular. Still, few experiences rival exploring the islands in a sea kayak, where the serenity is so overwhelming that you will feel at one with nature. As you paddle around the islands, the guide will point out the marine life, which should be easily visible in the shallows. Abundant crabs, sea stars and jellyfish live just below the water's surface. Animals such as sea otters, harbor seals, sea lions and porpoise are frequently spotted as well, some breaching the water's surface, others sunning on the rocky shores. And be sure to scan the trees for majestic bald eagles. The guide will also describe the influence and culture of the indigenous Tlingits, the area's first inhabitants.

- Cruise to a private island in an expedition catamaran.
- Kayak around the Siginaka Islands as the guide points out marine life in the shallows.
- Look for playful sea otters, sea lions and porpoise in the water and bald eagles overhead.
- Dress warmly in weather-appropriate clothing i.e. light rain jacket and layers.
- Wear flat comfortable walking shoes.

Access to boat is at the same pier as cruise ship. Guests will take two steps down to board. Assistance will be provided. Boat has an enclosed heated cabin and a restroom onboard. Guests are paired up in 2 person kayaks. Kayaks are launched from a private island that has indoor facilities and a bathroom on the island. Light snack provided.

SIT-002 HISTORIC SITKA AND NATURE WALK**(PRICES IN USD PER PERSON)****Duration: 3.25 Hrs Tour Price: \$0.00****Retail Price: \$129.00****Date: September 15, 2023 09:30 AM**

Discover Sitka's history and natural beauty on a revealing walk through the city and by meandering along a nature trail in Sitka National Historical Park. Your immersion into the surrounding natural world begins at the Alaska Raptor Center, where you will see how injured birds of prey are rehabilitated in hopes of releasing them back into the wild. The guide will further elaborate on the area's wildlife and flora during a walk through verdant Tongass National Forest, parts of which lie within Sitka National Historical Park. You will follow a trail lined with totem poles that relate stories of Alaska's native cultures. Back in Sitka, you will see St. Michael's Cathedral and the Russian bishop's house, two landmarks that show how deeply the Russians influenced Sitka's early development. Other architectural highlights include a number of restored Victorian homes and author James Michener's residence where he wrote the historical novel "Alaska." Your tour will conclude with a transfer back to the pier. If you wish to explore more of Sitka, you can choose to stay downtown and take a free shuttle back to the pier later.

- Watch birds of prey being rehabilitated for possible release into the wild.
- Walk a nature trail lined with hand-crafted totem poles.
- See 16th-century religious icons in a Russian Orthodox Cathedral.
- Admire Sitka's lovely Victorian homes.
- Dress warmly in layered weather-appropriate clothing.
- Wear flat closed-toe walking shoes.

The tour involves three miles of walking over uneven ground, trails and stairways at a steady pace. An admission ticket will be provided to visit St. Michael's Cathedral on your own after the tour. The order of sites visited may be reversed. A visit inside the Bishop's House is not included in the walk.

Bicycle along mountain roads, coastal highways and natural trails that wind through the immensely scenic countryside surrounding Sitka. The route begins downtown, but before long you will pedal through more remote areas that few visitors see. You will enjoy a unique perspective of the landscape, while maintaining a comfortable yet brisk pace. Stops will be made for snacks and water at the most picturesque spots, allowing you to revel in the glories of Mother Nature. Depending on the exact route, the mountain roads and nature trails should be well shaded, and the coastal byways should offer long views across the sea and well beyond the bay islands, especially if it is a clear day. Once you take in the pristine scenery, you will understand why Jean-Michel Cousteau's Ocean Futures recommends this excursion as an inspiration to act responsibly for the protection of our planet's vital ecosystems.

- Bicycle scenic byways along the sea and through the forest.
- Pause at inspiring picturesque areas that most visitors don't see.
- Share the experience with others that enjoy an invigorating ride.
- Dress comfortably for biking.
- Wear sturdy, closed-toe shoes.

This four-hour tour departs from downtown Sitka and is only recommended for advanced, physically fit bikers capable of riding between 16 and 23 miles with an elevation gain of more than 800 feet. Riders must wear helmets and attend a safety briefing. Bikes are 21-speed TREK mountain bikes with front shocks. Participants must be at least 16 years old and 4'10" tall. Minors must be accompanied by an adult parent to participate.

SIT-009 JET-CAT WILDLIFE QUEST AND BEACH EXPLORATION**Duration: 3.00 Hrs Tour Price: \$179.00****Retail Price: \$339.00****Date: September 15, 2023 09:30 AM**

Alaska's diverse marine and wildlife are yours to discover during this intimate wildlife-viewing adventure aboard a deluxe expedition-style catamaran, and a visit to a remote island. Depart the pier aboard a catamaran for a cruise along Sitka Sound's rugged coastline. Your captain will use his understanding of tides, weather and seasonal changes to design an expedition uniquely-suited to the day. The high speed and maneuverability of your catamaran will allow you to explore areas unreachable by conventional boat, and witness the very best of Sitka Sound's marine and coastal wildlife. During your ride, you may see whales, sea otters, puffins, brown bears and other diverse species that thrive in this pristine environment. As animals are sighted, the captain will skillfully maneuver the vessel to provide optimal viewing, and your naturalist guide will explain their fascinating life cycles and behavior. You can take in this encounter from the comfort of the window-lined cabin, or indulge all of your senses by experiencing it from the open deck. Next, you will step ashore on a remote island to explore colorful tide pools, trace the meandering tracks of wildlife, or settle on a giant beach log and take in the splendid beauty of your surroundings. While beachcombing, keep your eyes peeled for Japanese fishing floats and other exotic flotsam.

- Cruise serene Sitka Sound in a catamaran, looking for marine life such as whales.
- Take in majestic scenery in every direction.
- Visit a remote island to observe marine life in the tidal pools.
- Dress warmly in layered, weather-appropriate clothing.
- Wear sturdy, closed-toe shoes.

This tour involves up to a half-mile of hiking over wet, rocky and uneven terrain. Mostly at the guests discretion. This tour is recommended for guests in good physical condition. The minimum age to participate on this tour is 6 years old. Dress warmly in layers, and wear sturdy, closed-toe shoes. Rain poncho, binoculars, snacks and beverages are provided. This tour operates in all weather conditions.

SIT-010 TONGASS RAINFOREST NATURE HIKE**(PRICES IN USD PER PERSON)****Duration: 3.00 Hrs Tour Price: \$0.00****Retail Price: \$169.00****Date: September 15, 2023 09:30 AM**

Take an unforgettable hike through Tongass National Forest, the world's largest temperate rainforest, and observe the diversity of flora and fauna. You will follow the Starrigavin Trail through dense woods and muskeg, a common type of bog. In time, you will come to an estuary and creek, where the naturalist guide will explain the ecosystems, including how salmon spawn here each season. Once you reach the boardwalk, you will enjoy a different perspective of the estuary before ascending into the headlands. As the elevation rises, even slightly, you will notice a change in the vegetation. The animals that frequent these areas change accordingly, giving you a comprehensive look into the local forest life. You will also pass Mosquito Cove, an area named for the insects that swarmed here when charcoal was made during the early 19th century. Fortunately, the mosquitoes left when the industry died.

- Hike through the world's largest temperate rainforest.
- Listen to the naturalist explain the forest ecosystems.
- Learn the history of the Tongass National Forest and how the wilderness is now protected.
- Dress warmly in layered, weather-appropriate clothing.
- Wear sturdy, closed-toe shoes.

Each group sets its own pace and may hike between two and four miles. The hike includes steep climbing over uneven surfaces. The path mostly follows a level boardwalk and gravel path, but it does gain about 300 feet in elevation at the highest point. It is recommended that participants are in good physical condition. This non-smoking tour operates in all weather conditions. A rain poncho will be provided, if needed. The minimum age to participate is ten years old and children must be accompanied by a parent.

SIT-011 ALASKA 4X4 NATURE SAFARI**Duration: 3.50 Hrs Tour Price: \$229.00****Retail Price: \$379.00****Date: September 15, 2023 09:30 AM, 10:30 AM, 11:30 AM, 12:30 PM**

Cruise to Kruzof Island and ride an off-road vehicle through lush rainforest and meadows blanketed with wildflowers, where you may spot iconic Alaskan wildlife. As you ride the skiff to the island, the captain will discuss the diversity of marine life that thrives in the channels of Sitka Sound, including humpback whales that migrate here in the summer to feed. While there is no telling what you will observe, seals and sea otters are abundant. Once you disembark on the island, you will hop into a Polaris Rangers for an exhilarating ride through the rainforest. Your first stop will be the Iris Meadows Estuary, where coastal brown bears and Sitka black tail deer often gather. The remainder of the ride will be spent zipping along the forest trails, pausing every so often to take in the views.

- Cruise across Sitka Sound, looking for whales and other marine life.
- Zip through the wilds of Kruzof Island in a Polaris Rangers.
- Observe the natural beauty while looking for Alaskan wildlife.
- Dress warmly in clothing that you won't mind getting wet and muddy.
- Wear sturdy, closed-toe shoes.

As this tour involves travel over bumpy surfaces, guests with back or neck problems and those with limited mobility are discouraged from participating. Participation will be limited to a small number of guests. The minimum age to participate is nine years old; minors must be accompanied by a parent. Binoculars, helmet and a rain poncho or raingear will be provided. Each driver must present a valid driver's license and be at least 21 years of age. Guests will be required to sign a waiver to participate.

SIT-012 OCEAN RAFT ADVENTURES**Duration: 2.50 Hrs Tour Price: \$0.00****Retail Price: \$149.00****Date: September 15, 2023 09:30 AM, 10:30 AM, 11:30 AM, 12:30 PM**

An Ocean Rafting Adventure is the perfect way to make your visit to Sitka an exciting and unforgettable one. You'll begin by being equipped with state of the art gear for this adventure. The gear includes a coast guard style exposure suit, balaclava, safety glasses and gloves. At up to 30 mph fun on the waves comes with a blast of fresh air in the open seating of raft. Specially designed straddle seats provide comfortable and secure seating for this exciting trip out into nature. This thrill ride takes you off shore in ocean waters where you'll fly over the ocean swells while watching seabirds glide past.

Watch for whales and sea otters on your way to explore the ravaged volcanic coastline of Kruzof Island. While exploring this coastline you'll get up close to towering cliffs, where sea birds nest and go right into volcanic sea caves (weather permitting). At opportune times the Captain stops the boat and shuts down the engine so you can listen to the surf crashing off of volcanic cliffs and the songs of nesting seabirds or for whales breathing. Welcome to a world filled with the sights, sounds and smells of the ocean. This is an intimate glimpse of Alaska's wild splendor that will excite your senses and leave you with lasting memories.

- Take an exhilarating ride across the sea at speeds up to 30 miles per hour.
- Stop on occasion to observe the bountiful marine life.
- Pause just off Kruzof Island to watch seabirds nesting in the cliffs.
- Dress warmly in layered clothing.
- Wear sturdy, closed-toe shoes.

This tour includes limited walking but guests must be in good physical condition and able to take a high step to enter the raft. The raft ride is very bumpy with hard turns and jolts. It is not recommended for pregnant women, those with back, neck or hip joint problems or those who are prone to motion sickness. The tour is not available to wheelchair guests or those with mobility concerns. Participants must be at least nine years old and not weigh more than 350 pounds unless they can fit into an XXX extra-large exposure suit. Gear includes a balaclava hood, glasses, gloves and a cold weather flotation suit. There is a possibility that you will get wet. The tour route may vary depending on the prevailing weather conditions.

At the conclusion of your float, you will be served a deli-style lunch and hot drinks on the riverside before being transferred back to the pier.

The crew will also relate stories of their lives at sea and point out the indigenous marine life, which may include seals, sea otters and whales.

The crew will offer valuable tips on how to fish with circle hooks, work the sandy flats and jig in deeper waters. The state record for these behemoths stands at more than 450 pounds and catching a 100-pound halibut isn't unusual. Imagine the thrill of hooking a monster fish and reeling it in from the depths. The larger ones are usually females and can grow up to eight feet in length and five feet in width, which is why they're often referred to as "barn doors." If you catch one, you'll notice that a halibut has smooth scales, a light-colored bottom side and a darker top, colors that provide natural camouflage.

- Fish for halibut and Pacific cod in relatively remote waters away from other anglers.
- Use the crew's advice and fishing tips to increase your chances for landing a big fish.
- Watch for breaching whales, seals and eagles when cruising the fishing grounds.

Once you reach the prime fishing grounds, a deckhand will supply you with fishing gear and you will troll for salmon using a downrigger. Anglers will rotate from rod to rod, so that everyone has the same amount of time on each one. Five species of salmon live in these waters, including king salmon, which are also called Chinook salmon. Pink salmon are the most abundant species and they are vigorous fighters. If you want to keep what you catch, it can be processed and shipped anywhere in the United States.

- Fish for hard-fighting, highly prized salmon.
- Enjoy a stunningly beautiful, natural backdrop.
- Ship your catch home if you wish.
- Dress warmly in layered clothing.

Participants must be at least 6 years of age. Fishing lasts approximately 3 ½ to 4 hours. Alaska State Law requires a fishing license that can be purchased on the fishing boat for \$25. During king salmon season, you must purchase an additional \$15 tag. If you decide to process your catch and ship it home, you will need a credit card. Fish can only be shipped within the United States.
