Enjoy a panoramic tour of Castries before heading south to see more highlights in Soufriere, a colonial town in the shadow of the island's iconic Pitons. As you drive through the capital of St. Lucia, you will pass landmarks such as Castries' beautifully ornate central library and bustling Derek Walcott Square, named for the St. Lucian-born poet and playwright that won the Nobel Prize in 1992. You will then follow a winding coastal road through fishing villages and past banana plantations on the way to Soufriere. Your first stop will be the Diamond Botanical Gardens, a peaceful retreat that occupies an idyllic spot on the site of a therapeutic spring bath built in 1784 for the troops of King Louis XVI. The grounds are still restorative. You will also visit Morne Coubaril, the island's oldest French Creole estate, where you will enjoy a buffet lunch before cruising back to Castries on a catamaran.

- See Castries' highlights, including a square named for St. Lucia's Nobel Prize winner.
- Pause atop the former military post Morne Fortune and take in the views of Castries.
- Marvel at the spectacular coastal scenery on the way to Soufriere.
- Meander through a wonderfully serene botanical garden.
- Savor a buffet lunch of Caribbean classics at the island's oldest French Creole estate.
- Return to Castries on a catamaran, pausing along the way for a refreshing swim.
- Dress in weather-appropriate clothing.
- Wear a swimsuit under a cover-up and bring a towel and sunscreen.
- Wear flat comfortable walking shoes or aqua socks.

This tour includes about 2½ hours of moderate walking, at times over uneven, gravel and dirt surfaces. The tour is available to wheelchair guests who have a collapsible wheelchair, are able to make their own way on and off the coach and have an able-bodied companion to assist them. Those with mobility concerns should evaluate their stamina and ability before joining the tour, as there is a significant amount of physical activity. Guests participating in water activities do so at their own risk and responsibility. Maximum weight suggestion is 250 pounds. The order of sites viewed or visited may vary. Menu items are subject to change.

Ride the Hibiscus Trolley Train through Castries as the guide regales you with entertaining stories of the capital city's history and architectural highlights. Although the exact route will depend on the traffic conditions, you can expect to pass the bustling craft market, beautiful colonial government buildings and Derek Walcott Square, named for the St. Lucian-born poet and playwright that won the Nobel Prize in 1992. The highlight will be visiting the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception, the largest church in the Caribbean when it was completed in 1897. Be sure to look above the altar, where you will see a representation of St. Lucia, the island's patron saint. She died in 304 A.D., the victim of Christian persecution during the reign of Roman emperor Diocletian. Following the city tour, you will enjoy a bit of free time at the beach where you can enjoy a complimentary rum or fruit punch.

- See the highlights in Castries from the comfort of an open-air trolley train.
- Hear about notable local figures such as Derek Walcott, a Nobel Prize-winner in 1992.
- Visit the cathedral that was the largest of its kind when completed in 1897.

From this former military outpost that once boasted two forts, you will gaze out over the Castries and the turquoise seas beyond. You will then head inland, following a rugged route through traditional villages such as Ti-Rocher, Destrameaux and Balata. In time, you will arrive at one of the most spectacular beaches on the island's eastern shore. With no schedule to follow, you can relax however you see fit. Don't miss the opportunity to swim though, as the waters here are absolutely gorgeous.

Upon arriving at Errard Estate in the heart of the lush rainforest, you will receive a brief orientation on zip lining to maximize the experience. Then, the real fun will begin. The zip line features nine wooden platforms in the trees, all at different heights. During stops, the guides will prepare you for the next thrilling leg of the journey and describe the most fascinating sights along the way. If you are interested in the vegetation that you are zip lining through, the guides will be happy to describe the rainforest flora in detail. At the end of the zip line adventure, you will follow a nature trail back to the welcome center for a refreshing drink.

- Tear through the tree canopy while safely harnessed on a zip line.
- Observe the gorgeous surrounding landscape from high above the forest floor.
- Listen to commentary from the guides, while pausing on the platforms between zip lines.

Ride along the backroads of western St. Lucia in a Jeep and then cruise along the coast to the Pitons, the island's most iconic attraction. While driving through the gorgeous countryside, you will pause at viewpoints that offer particularly unique perspectives of highlights such as the fertile Roseau Valley and Marigot Bay, where you will board a sleek catamaran. Densely forested hills surround the bay on three sides, and the terrain will only get steeper and more spectacular as you cruise south. You will pass secluded coves, idyllic beaches, lovely villages such as Anse La Raye and long stretches of undeveloped wilderness on the way to the Pitons. These two, magnificently scenic volcanic spires are so bio-diverse that UNESCO declared them a World Heritage site. You will have plenty of time to snap photos of the soaring Pitons from several angles before disembarking to swim at a nearby beach.

Although the trip there will be magnificently scenic, few sights compare to the park's underwater wonders. The labyrinth of shallow reefs and coral heads provide habitats for all sorts of brightly colored tropical fish including French grunts, goatfish, jacks and snappers. You may also spot sea urchins, starfish and occasional octopuses tucked away in the rocks and crevices. Flying gurnards are especially fascinating, as these bottom dwellers typically expand their fins like wings to scare off predators. You won't have to snorkel the entire time, as you can always rest aboard the boat or relax on the beach. As you make your way back, refreshments will be served on board.

- Snorkel along the shallow reefs and coral heads, looking for marine life other than fish.
- Relax onboard or swim over to the beach, if you prefer not to snorkel the whole time.

Settle in for a rambling drive through the countryside that presents the island's natural beauty and architectural charms. It won't take long to reach La Toc Battery, a 19th-century fort built to protect St. Lucia's vital coal stations. It is an intriguing site with many of its tunnels, shell lifts and ventilation shafts still intact. Driving on, you will enter a bucolic landscape of banana plantations tucked between undulating hills before passing through the rustic village of Anse La Raye. Continuing on, you will soon arrive at Marigot Bay, a tranquil blue lagoon that the surrounding hills shelter, making it an ideal natural yacht harbor. On the return to Castries, you will pause for snacks and a beverage at St. Marks, a grand colonial-era house that overlooks the harbor.

- Enjoy a panoramic drive through the most scenic areas on St. Lucia's western shore.
- Explore the remains of the 19th-century fort La Toc Battery.
- Marvel at the sweeping seaside views that capture the splendor of St. Lucia.
- Snack on Caribbean treats at a beautiful colonial house overlooking Castries' harbor.
- Dress in weather-appropriate clothing.
- Wear flat comfortable walking shoes.

There are steps at La Toc Battery and St. Marks. Menu items are subject to change. Guests must be able to get on & off the buses and there are 5 steps leading up to St. Mark's and approximately 10 steps at La Toc Battery.

Ride an aerial tram high into the rainforest canopy and then descend by zip line, an exhilarating way to soar through the trees like a bird. Even the drive to the eco-park will be scenic, as you will pass through traditional inland communities such as Babonneau and Fond Assau. Once you arrive, the naturalist guide will assist you on a trial run on the zip line cable. Then, off you will go on an aerial tram that will take you to the top of the zip line. It is all downhill from here—literally. In all, you will race through the treetops along eight zip line cables, each offering a unique thrill and different perspective of the rainforest. As you effortlessly glide down, you will be treated to outstanding views of the sea and the northern half of the island.

- Glide through the rainforest canopy comfortably seated in an aerial tram's gondola.
- Take in the spectacular views of the St. Lucian countryside on the way up.
- Race down through the rainforest on a zip line, stopping between runs to observe nature.

Participants must be at least 5 years of age and weigh no more than 350 lbs. The minimum waist measurement for the safety harness is 45.7 cm/18 inches and the maximum waist is 127 cm/50 inches. No flip flops, shorts or skirts are permitted.

Race down St. Lucia's gorgeous western coast in an open-top speedboat and stop to swim in the crystal-clear waters between the Pitons, the island's only UNESCO World Heritage site. To maximize the experience, you will board the speedboat right at the pier, which will give you all the more time to enjoy the exhilarating ride. The island's western shore is immensely scenic and has been the backdrop for numerous movies. As you zip around beautiful Marigot Bay, you will understand why parts of the first "Pirates of the Caribbean" movie were shot there. The twin volcanically formed Pitons also had a cameo role because of their dramatic scenery. Once the speedboat anchors between these twin soaring spires, you can jump into the typically tranquil waters for a refreshing swim and to snorkel, if you wish. The natural beauty of the setting and the bountiful wonders below the water's surface will be breathtaking.

- Zip along St. Lucia's gorgeous western coast in an open-top speedboat.
- Pass lovely villages, secluded coves and endless beaches on the way to the twin Pitons.
- Stop between the UNESCO World Heritage site Pitons to swim and snorkel.
- Dress in weather-appropriate clothing.

Behold the natural beauty above and below the water's surface by kayaking along St. Lucia's western coast and snorkeling farther offshore in an area teeming with marine life. You will reach the snorkeling site by boat, which will anchor in the open sea allowing you plenty of time to explore the underwater world. You can expect to see a parade of brightly colored tropical fish such as French grunts, goatfish, jacks and snappers. Back in Marigot Bay, you will ease into a kayak and paddle down the beautiful coast to where the Roseau River gently flows into Roseau Bay. The river is ideal for observing wildlife as dense mangrove forests line the banks. Birds in particular flock there in great numbers because the exposed intertwined roots of the mangroves provide protective shelter. As you paddle along, you may spot mangrove cuckoos, a long-tailed reclusive bird that often perches motionless waiting for prey such as insects and lizards.

- Paddle a kayak along the coast and the gently flowing, mangrove-lined Roseau River.
- Look for wildlife, particularly birds that perch in the mangroves' exposed roots.
- Snorkel an area offshore with crystal-clear waters that are teeming with marine life.
- Dress in weather-appropriate clothing.
- Wear flat comfortable walking shoes.

STL-009 A PANORAMIC VIEW OF ST. LUCIA**(PRICES IN USD PER PERSON)****Duration: 3.25 Hrs Tour Price: \$0.00****Retail Price: \$129.00****Date: March 08, 2024 09:30 AM**

Admire the striking natural beauty of St. Lucia on a meandering panoramic ride with occasional stops at the most scenic viewpoints. From atop Morne Fortune, you will enjoy a sweeping view of Castries. Ironically, Morne Fortune means "hill of good luck," but it was the site of numerous horrific battles between French and English troops. Another stop will be made at Caribelle Batik, where you will watch artists creating one-of-a-kind fashions using hot wax and colorful dyes. Still, it is the scenic beauty of St. Lucia that captures so many hearts, as you will discover firsthand from the overlook at La Guerre, which was once the island's largest banana plantation. Later, while meandering through the gardens at Stony Hill with the estate's owners, you will hear about the joys of living in the tropics.

- Enjoy some of the island's most picturesque views from hilltop lookouts.
- Discover the intriguing history behind the sites that you visit.
- Tour an estate with its owners, as they describe life on St. Lucia.
- Dress in weather-appropriate clothing.
- Wear flat comfortable walking shoes.

This tour includes a limited amount of walking and steps; however, the sites are not wheelchair accessible and therefore the tour is not considered suitable for wheelchair guests.

STL-014 RAINFOREST AERIAL TRAM**Duration: 3.50 Hrs Tour Price: \$0.00****Retail Price: \$179.00****Date: March 08, 2024 09:30 AM, 11:30 AM**

Ride through and above the rainforest on an aerial tram that presents a 360° bird's-eye view of the island's natural beauty. The tram takes off in the heights of the old-growth rainforest and soars even higher, well into the tree canopy in certain areas and even above the trees elsewhere. Along the way, the guide will point out the highlights and provide enlightening commentary about the flora and fauna. The rainforest is one of the few places on the island where you will find the endemic St. Lucia parrot, which is known locally as the jacquot. You might also spot a number of gommier trees, whose wood the Carib Indians originally used for hand-carved dugout canoes. If you see bursts of color in the dense foliage, chances are, it will be flowers such as lavender stars and white lace. At the end of your Tram Ride, there is an optional walk through the beautiful Hummingbird Garden.

- Glide through the rainforest canopy comfortably seated in an aerial tram gondola.
- Listen to enlightening descriptions of the flora and fauna living in the rainforest.
- Look for the endemic St. Lucia parrot, the country's national bird.
- Dress in weather-appropriate clothing.
- Wear flat comfortable walking shoes.

A restaurant and a snack bar are available for dining on your own. Guests are required to sign a waiver in order to participate. The walk through the Hummingbird Garden is approximately 15 to 20 minutes and guests will be walking on uneven terrain, small garden stones and would have to climb approximately 25 to 30 steps. Guests who go ashore do so with the understanding that they will be mixing with members of the general public.

PTP-005 MARINE NATURE RESERVE & SNORKELING

Cruise to a protected marine reserve in a motorboat and snorkel along a huge coral reef teeming with marine life. Your destination is Grand Cul-de-Sac Marine Nature Reserve, an expansive bay protected by an immense coral reef that is a UNESCO World Biological Reserve. Here, accompanied by a guide instructor, you will embark on a snorkeling expedition. There is no telling what you will see, but you can expect it to be spectacular, as the reef is home to countless species of fish, sponges and crustaceans. You may spot bright colored parrotfish, grouper, starfish, seahorses and even sea turtles gracefully swimming through the crystalline waters. Moray eels are another species that live in the reef although they can be difficult to see as they often hide in the crevices of the coral. Afterwards, you will cruise to one of the idyllic islands nearby and enjoy a complimentary drink and some free time at the beach.

- Cruise through the Salted River that separates the main islands of Guadeloupe.
- Enjoy an up-close look at the underwater world that is only possible by snorkeling.
- Expect to see parrotfish, starfish, seahorses and even sea turtles.
- Spend free time relaxing on the beach of a nearby island.
- Dress in weather-appropriate clothing.
- Wear a swimsuit under a cover-up and bring a towel.
- Wear flat comfortable walking shoes or aqua socks.

This tour includes limited walking, mainly at the guests' discretion. There will be sandy surfaces to negotiate at the island. The tour is not available to wheelchair guests or to those with mobility concerns. Participants should be able to enter and exit the boat with limited assistance. Snorkelers should be good swimmers. Snorkeling equipment is provided. Guests taking part in water activities do so at their own risk and responsibility. The minimum age to participate is 4 years old. Children under the age of 18 must be accompanied by an adult parent or guardian.

PTP-008 ECO KAYAKING & PADDLEBOARD EXPERIENCE

Kayak through the virgin mangroves lining Grand Cul-de-Sac Marin Nature Reserve, an area teeming with wildlife, above and below the water's surface. Upon reaching the fishing village of Vieux Bourg, you will be welcomed by a naturalist guide that will accompany you on the kayaking adventure. After a short briefing, you will paddle off into the Grand Cul-de-Sac Marine Nature Reserve, an expansive bay protected by an immense coral reef. The majority of the time will be spent kayaking through the mangroves that line the shore. You may encounter pelicans diving for fish, frigate birds soaring overhead and prehistoric-looking iguanas sunning in the branches. You can expect the water to be clear and shallow enough to spot starfish, crustaceans and sea cucumbers, a curious creature that sometimes eats mud. Even the mangroves are biologically fascinating, as the exposed roots of these "walking trees" are adapted to filter salt water, allowing them to thrive where other plants can't.

- Kayak through a mangrove-lined nature reserve teeming with wildlife.
- Look for pelicans, frigate birds and iguanas in the tree branches.
- Learn about the flora and fauna from the naturalist guide.
- Observe the marine life below the surface, as the water should be crystal clear.
- Dress in weather-appropriate clothing.

The scenery will be spectacular throughout the journey, but the real draw will be the chance to see the rare St. Vincent Parrot. There is a good chance of seeing one or at least hearing its call. Similarly, the Whistling Warbler is another bird endemic to St. Vincent and often observed in the reserve. The boldly patterned, black-and-white warbler is usually seen happily flitting about the undergrowth. It too has a distinctive call that rises steadily in volume before ending emphatically.

Many of the landmarks in town are churches, and you will enjoy an exterior view of three of the most impressive ones. St. George's Anglican Church is known for its lovely stained-glass windows. St. Mary's Catholic Cathedral of the Assumption was built in stages and its eclectic architecture reflects the additions. Freed slaves help build Kingstown Methodist Church, a pastel-colored brick building. Leaving Kingstown behind, you will drive along the island's windward side, admiring the dramatic scenery, which includes black-sand beaches, rocky bluffs and coastal villages.

- Pass many of Kingstown's most historical landmarks
- View three churches, including one with stained-glass windows that Queen Victoria donated.
- Observe another church that freed slaves constructed.
- Behold the beautiful shoreline and coastal villages along the island's windward side.
- Sample coconut water and coconut meat or "jelly," a staple on the island.
- Dress in weather-appropriate clothing.
- Wear flat comfortable walking shoes.

Delight in the exotic flora and fauna in the Tobago Rainforest Preserve, a virginal expanse that covers much of the northeastern island. Being a virgin rainforest, with trees soaring as high as 165 feet into the air, the preserve supports an incredible abundance and variety of rare flora and fauna. Each story of the rainforest contains different species, including exotic tree ferns, bromeliad-covered cycads, devilwood, parrot apples and spiny gru-gru palms. Accompanied by a well-informed guide, you may also see all sorts of colorful birds that might include blue-backed manakins, white-tailed sabrewings, yellow-legged thrushes and blue-crowned motmots, which make their nests in tunnels. The beautiful collared trogon is another bird commonly found here, but it flies so rapidly that it is often difficult to identify. You are more likely to hear its plaintive call, a low mellow "caow caow."

While visiting in 1962, Princess Margaret named the idyllic pool for its shallow, translucent waters.

- Look for schools of brilliant tropical fish and the occasional sea turtle.

Along the way, you will pass through several seaside villages while the guide points out attractions such as Beausejour Bay, which played a role in the 1983 U.S. invasion of Grenada. Upon reaching centuries-old Douglaston Spice Estate, you will discover traditional methods of preparing spices. You might watch mace being removed from nutmeg or cinnamon sticks being rolled from a tree's inner bark. Grenada is a leading producer of spices and is even nicknamed the Spice Island. Then, it's on to the interior mountains and Grand Etang Lake, which an extinct volcano formed long ago. The water is typically cobalt blue and lush vegetation grows right to the shoreline. During your visit, you will have time to for a refreshing drink at the Park's Visitors' Center. Not far away, you will find beautiful Annandale Falls. It too is edged by native flora, especially hanging ferns and tropical flowers.

- Watch spices being prepared and packaged at a historical estate.
- Gain an understanding of why Grenada is known as the Spice Island.
- View the bays where U.S. forces landed during the 1983 invasion of Grenada.
- Gaze down on an impossibly blue lake that filled the crater of an extinct volcano.
- Behold glorious Annandale Falls and the hanging ferns that surround it.
- Dress in weather-appropriate clothing.
- Wear flat comfortable, closed-toe walking shoes.

This tour involves approximately one hour of moderate walking with a steep uphill to negotiate at Annandale. The tour is not available to wheelchair guests and those with mobility concerns should evaluate their stamina and ability before joining the tour. Guests must be at least 18 years old to consume alcohol.

Bon Bini na Bonaire! Enjoy a brisk round-the-town welcome to Kralendijk from the comfort of an electric-powered Tuk-Tuk, enjoying the open air and sights. On this island, the three-wheeled mini-taxis don't make the "tuk tuk" sound of the famous Thai version – because this Caribbean version is electric, eco-friendly and noiseless. All the better for the scenic environment you'll be touring, and to hear the enlightening commentary by your local driver/guide. One of the top sights you'll encounter in this orientation ride is heavily fortified Fort Orange, built in 1639 for attacks that never came. It still has its cannons, just in case. Another highlight is the delightful Dutch architecture widespread in this island capital city whose name means "coral dike" in that language. You'll also see Bonaire's largest church and have a chance to view the saltwater flats where flamingoes sometimes congregate in the shallows to scoop up brine shrimp with their upside-down beaks and backwards knees. That diet is what gives them their trademark rosy-orange hue. Once the tuk-tukking is done, you'll be dropped back at the pier.

- Hop aboard an eco-friendly electric Tuk-Tuk mini-taxi for an orientation spin around Kralendijk.
- Enjoy your equally-friendly driver/guide's commentary about the sights you're seeing.
- See Fort Orange and its cannons, Bonaire's largest church and more.
- Wear light, weather-appropriate clothing.
- Flat, comfortable shoes are recommended.
- Bring a hat, sunglasses and sunscreen.

Head into the arid wilds of the Washikemba reserve on an All-Terrain Vehicle and experience a hauntingly beautiful landscape. A brief coach ride brings you to the pick-up point, where you'll get your safety checkout before taking off eastward toward Washikemba. Four-wheeling your way into this rugged region, you'll reach areas most normal vehicles can't – letting you encounter Bonaire in its most natural, undisturbed state. You might even see wild donkeys and goats, and iguanas basking in the sun. At the amazingly remote Spelonk Lighthouse, marking the island's easternmost point, you can't help but notice that the only other way here is by sketchy footpath. And it's sure to be an inspiring moment when you also realize that the only sound you can hear here is surf crashing on a rocky shore. Once you've absorbed that awhile, it's on to one of Bonaire's many caves, some still bearing inscriptions from Arawak Indians who lived here in pre-Columbian days. Today's cave residents are likely to be bats, clinging to the roof in great numbers as they wait for dusk to fly off in search of tasty insects. It's a good thing your dinner plans are elsewhere.

- Experience Bonaire's arid landscape in its natural state in the Washikemba reserve.
- Make your way there by All-Terrain Vehicle, which can take you where other vehicles can't.
- Find yourself at a far-off lighthouse where the only sound is the ocean, or maybe a wild goat.
- Visit a cave where ancients might once have lived, but now only bats. Lots and lots of bats.
- See other wild places, including a remote settlement at the head of the reserve's sea lagoon.
- Wear comfortable clothing, including long trousers.
- Flat, sturdy closed-toe shoes are required.
- Bring a hat, sunglasses and sunscreen.

This tour includes limited walking, mainly at guests' discretion. There will be about 80 minutes of driving an All-Terrain-Vehicle over mostly off-road, bumpy conditions. Guests will be screened to determine their competence in being able to do simple maneuvers on the vehicle. Pedal across Bonaire's relatively flat countryside, admiring the island's natural beauty and observing daily life here in the tropics. A drive through Kralendijk brings you to the departure point where you'll be set up with your mountain bike to begin this 12-mile cycling adventure that passes an array of classic Bonaire sights. Capture panoramas at Tolo Beach, a spectacular stretch of sand also known as Ol' Blue. Admire the dilapidated charm of Landhouse Karpata, a former plantation that raised goats, grew aloe and produced charcoal – now gone to seed. You might see wild donkeys lazing about; they've been island residents ever since Spaniards brought their ancestors here 500 years ago. Ahead lies Goto Lake, a favorite gathering place for Bonaire's flamingoes. They feed in the saltwater shallows here, using their upside-down beaks to scoop up brine shrimp – a diet that gives them their trademark rosy-orange hue. Stopping at Dos Pos, a drinking well at a nearby plantation, you're likely to spot other birds including lively yellow bananaquits. Once at Rincon, the island's oldest town, you'll take a well-earned outdoor rest at the Rose Inn, then leave your wheels behind and hop aboard ours for the return drive to Kralendijk.

- Get fitted and head out for 12 miles of freewheeling tropical exploration by mountain bike.
- Pedal along a coastal path that also turns inland after rounding a flamingo-favored salt lake.
- Pass beautiful beachfront and wander an abandoned old plantation.
- Be on the lookout for wild donkeys and stop by a drinking well that birds frequent.
- At the ride's end, enjoy a rest break in Rincon and a lift by coach back to the ship.
- Wear light-weight clothing.
- Flat, closed-toe shoes are required.
- Bring a hat, sunglasses and sunscreen.

You'll head out from the pier and drive through Kralendijk. As you get further east, you'll notice the land getting more rugged. Before long, the paved highway will be in the rearview as you enter trackless, arid countryside. This sparsely populated part of the island is both beautiful and rugged. You're usually more likely to encounter wild donkeys, Caribbean parakeets, yellow-shouldered parrots or prehistoric-looking iguanas than humans around here. One exception is when you reach Sorobon Beach, catering to windsurfers who can't resist the waves kicked up by the steady offshore breezes. After a pause, you'll press on to pass one of Bonaire's five lighthouses then clustered stone huts that once housed slaves who worked in the surrounding salt flats until slavery was brought to an end here in 1863. These saltwater shallows are a known place where Bonaire's flamingoes gather to feed, using their upside-down beaks to scoop up brine shrimp – the unique diet responsible for their trademark rosy-orange hue. Perhaps they'll be hungry when you're passing through.

- Explore an arid, undeveloped part of Bonaire where the scenery is all about rugged beauty.
- Be on the lookout for wild donkeys, chattering parrots, and iguanas lounging in the sun.
- Stop at a faraway, breeze-swept beach where the waves are irresistible to windsurfers.
- Visit salt flats where flamingoes often congregate to feed, and stand around on one leg.
- Wear light-weight clothing.
- Flat, closed-toe shoes are required.
- Bring a hat, sunglasses and sunscreen.

This tour includes a limited amount of walking, mainly at guests' discretion during the stops. The off-road terrain can be bumpy and there are high steps involved in entering and exiting the vehicle. The tour is not available to wheelchair guests, pregnant women or children under 12. It may also not be suitable for those with mobility concerns or previous back or neck injuries. As the Samur's traditional red sails catch the wind and she slides out to sea, it's easy to imagine you're being transported back in time. The character of your destination only amplifies this sensation. Afloat in gin-clear waters and as deserted as Robinson Crusoe's island, Klein Bonaire is just west of Kralendijk – and a world away. En route, your captain will elaborate on what you can expect to find on the island and at Ebo's Reef just off its shore. The beach here is blissfully uncluttered – no snack stands, chaises or jetski rental operations – and the snorkeling reef presents a colorful array of marine life. You might see parrotfish, angelfish, sea horses and turtles, all gracefully swimming through their world, undisturbed by your presence. Relax in whatever way you please; there's no set schedule. After about an hour you'll tender back to the Samur to enjoy tropical fruits and rum punch on the return sail.

- Enjoy two superb sensations: riding the wind on a classic sailing ship and playing on a deserted island.
- Tender out to an authentic Siamese junk hand-built in Thailand with beautiful wood-carved details.
- Set sail for Kleine Bonaire, an unspoiled natural island half a mile and a million years from Kralendijk.
- On the island, spend your time along its gorgeous shores or snorkeling its pristine waters and reef.
- Be treated to rum punch and tropical fruits during the return sail to Bonaire.
- Wear swimwear under a cover-up and bring a towel from the ship.
- Flat, comfortable shoes or aqua socks are recommended.
- Bring a hat, sunglasses and sunscreen as needed.

This tour includes a limited amount of walking, mainly at guests' discretion on the island. If you do opt to jump in and investigate the goings-on, expect to see longsnout seahorses and a full spectrum of colorful reef fish like wrasses, grunts, goatfish, parrotfish and tangs. Sea turtles also thrive here in the protected park waters. This optional snorkeling is unguided, but a crew member will be keeping a watchful eye out from the deck. After about an hour at anchor, the sails will be raised again for the voyage back to harbor, with an open bar en route.

- Skim over clear Caribbean waters aboard a sleek and roomy sailing cat named Mushi Mushi.
- Cross into the long-protected Bonaire Marine Park and moor for a blissful while.
- Choose your pleasure: relaxing and sunbathing on board or investigating the reef by snorkel.
- Under the surface, encounter a world of lush corals, sea turtles, colorful fish and invertebrates.
- Toast the wonders of the sea during the open-bar return sail to Kralendijk.
- Wear swimwear under a cover-up and bring a towel from the ship.
- Flat, comfortable shoes with non-slip sole or aqua socks are recommended.
- Bring a hat, sunglasses and sunscreen as needed.

While this tour includes a limited amount of walking, guests must be able to make their way on and off both the tender boat and the catamaran with limited assistance. While there's no telling exactly what will come into view, you can expect to see graceful sea turtles coasting in the currents and a full spectrum of colorful fish among the reef corals, including wrasses, grunts, goatfish, parrotfish and tangs. The onboard naturalist can help with fish identification or questions, and there are illustrated Caribbean fish charts on board as well. After about 75 minutes spent surveying this marvelous environment, you'll return to the pier. Dry and content.

- See what's going on underwater in Bonaire's reefs without getting your feet – or anything else – wet.
- Take your shaded seat on a 32-foot glass-bottom boat headed for Bonaire Marine Park.
- Glide slowly from reef to reef in this protected reserve, watching an everchanging scene of corals, turtles, colorful fish and other marine life.
- Rely on the onboard naturalist or fish charts for help telling a goatfish apart from a parrotfish, or a tang.
- Wear light-weight, comfortable clothing.
- Flat, comfortable shoes with non-slip sole are recommended.
- Bring a hat, sunglasses and sunscreen as needed.

This tour, which includes a very limited amount of walking, is not available to wheelchair guests and those with mobility concerns are cautioned to carefully evaluate their personal level of ability before participating. There is no restroom on the boat.

Paddling south along the coast, you'll be treated to great views of Kralendijk in one direction and the magnificently unspoiled natural island of Klein Bonaire in the other, surrounded by the protected waters of Bonaire National Marine Park. Speaking of those waters, you can gaze right down into them through the glass bottom of your kayak and see a whole other world where the locals have polyps, fins and flippers. After about 30 minutes of paddling, you'll reach the beach with about an hour to spend as you please, either relaxing on the sand or taking advantage of the snorkeling here, ideal for all skill levels. Afterwards, you'll kayak back to where you started.

- Accompanied by your naturalist guide, paddle along the Bonaire coast in a unique glass-bottom kayak.
- Enjoy outstanding above-water scenery and below-the-water views at the same time.
- Arrive at a beach where the lazing is fine, and the snorkeling is typically calm and excellent.
- Take the plunge to see abundant Caribbean fish, stands of coral, maybe even a Hawksbill or Green turtle gracefully swimming along, completely oblivious to your presence.
- Your special two-person, sit-on-top clear kayak comes equipped with backrest seats, life vests and a drybag for personal belongings.
- Wear swimwear under a cover-up and bring a towel from the ship.

The reefs here in Bonaire are among the healthiest in the Caribbean thanks to almost 50 continuous years of committed environmental protection – so chances are good that you'll see colorful fish, seahorses and even sea turtles under the surface. If indulgence is on your agenda, an intimate spa and restaurant are on site, as are several private cabanas.

- Enjoy a short, scenic drive along the Bonaire coast to Spice Beach Club.
- Arrive to a warm greeting accompanied by a cool Caribbean drink.
- Spend your hours here doing just what you like – sunning, beaching, swimming, snorkeling, kayaking or enjoying a spa treatment.
- Satisfy your hunger at the onsite restaurant, your thirst at the Beach Bar, or retreat from it all in a private seaside cabana.
- Wear swimwear under a cover-up and bring a towel from the ship.
- Flat, comfortable shoes with a non-slip sole or aqua socks are recommended.
- Bring a hat, sunglasses and sunscreen as needed.

On the way back to the pier, you'll pass salt ponds where Bonaire's famous flamingoes gather to feed on brine shrimp.

- Travel around the island by panoramic coach, stopping at numerous natural and cultural landmarks.
- Visit an outdoor venue where the trees are shady and the liqueur is flavored with cactus and lime.
- Learn the history of Bonaire's second oldest building, forming the heart of a cultural park.
- Pass salt ponds where flamingoes congregate to feed on brine shrimp and turn rosy-orange.

The bridge demonstrates the unpredictable force of nature, as do the Casibari Rock formations, a cluster of massive boulders that were created when nearby tectonic plates shifted.

- Visit the island's oldest lighthouse, a soaring beacon that offers stunning vistas.
- See a historical seaside chapel built on the site of the first Catholic church in Aruba.
- Behold the remains of a natural coral bridge that the erosive force of nature leveled.
- Marvel at the oddly shaped rock formations that shifting tectonic plates created.
- Dress in weather-appropriate clothing.

Aruba's oldest lighthouse, the beacon is named to honor a ship that sank here in 1891, before the island constructed its first lighthouse. Continuing on, the terrain will become much more arid, an ideal landscape for cacti, Aruba's signature divi-divi trees, iguanas and wild goats. The jumble of massive boulders known as the Casibari Rock formations rise out of this desert-like environment and are well worth closer inspection. Ostriches also thrive here, as you will discover at a farm that breeds these flightless birds, which are the world's largest. Finally, you will pause for photos of the Baby Natural Bridge, a coral rock formation that spanned a finger of the sea until it collapsed in 2005

- Visit the island's oldest lighthouse, a soaring beacon that offers stunning vistas.
- Travel through a desert-like landscape full of divi-divi trees shaped by tradewinds.
- Visit a farm that breeds ostriches and emus.
- Marvel at the oddly shaped Casibari Rock formations that shifting tectonic plates created.
- Behold the remains of a natural coral bridge that the erosive force of nature leveled.
- Dress in weather-appropriate clothing.
- Wear flat comfortable walking shoes.

The Germans torpedoed the oil tanker in World War II, but much of it is still intact at a depth of about 25 feet. You will be able to see sections of cabins and the pipe line system, all of it home to a plethora of marine creatures.
